

**Mahaska-Wapello Early Childhood IOWA
Board of Directors Meeting Minutes
Thursday, September 14th, 2017, 4:00 PM
Fremont Community Center
107 East Main Street, Fremont, Iowa 52561**



Board Members Present: Blaine Vos, Larry Reisch, Dean Cremer, Ali Wilson, Gina Buttikofer, Lynelle Diers and Shannon Hora.

Board Members Absent: Nick Maxwell.

Community Members Present: Lynn Godwin (Sieda Family Support), Jill Lane and Joan Garrett (GPAEA), Leann Andre (CCR&R), Jane Matzen (American Home Finding Association), and Teresa Ross (Ottumwa Y Discovery Lanes).

Staff Present: Pat McReynolds (Area Director).

1. Call to Order: The meeting was called to order by Board Chair, Blaine Vos at 4:01 PM. Quorum met (7:8). Introductions were made.

2. Approval of September 14th, 2017 Agenda: Dean Cremer made a motion to approve the agenda, Lynelle Diers 2nd the motion. All Board Members present approved, motion passed unanimously. The August 31st, 2017 board minutes will be reviewed and approved at the October 26th, 2017 board meeting.

3. MWECI Board Review of FYE2017 Annual Report Sections:

a. Board review & discussion of state 2017 AR Sections: *Board Membership/Attendance/Community Plan Updates*. Pat McReynolds, Area Director, provided copies of the entire report for all board members. Community partners were encouraged to download the draft copy from the website. All Iowa Code board required representation positions were filled for the entire fiscal year. The Board met quorum requirements for each (10) meeting held. Total hours board members spent at board meetings was 96 hours. The community plan update reflected the work the board has done to review all indicator data, trends and analysis throughout the year.

b. Board review & discussion of state 2017 AR Sections:

- *Child Care Nurse Consultant* (indirect & direct services). Pat explained (reminded) the Board members the difference between direct and indirect services. The CCNC also provides car seat safety inspections and 4Y hearing screens. Pat reviewed how these services are direct services and reflected in another part of the report. The Board expressed appreciation for all the exceptional work Jane Matzen, CCNC, has done in our communities.
- *Technical Assistance: Consultation, Mentoring, Coaching:* CCR&R/Child Care Consultant (indirect service) and BASEC/PBIS for early learning (indirect service). Pat reminded the Board members how "like" services are grouped together and data (numbers) are combined to show the total impact of the service type. Both the CCC and BASEC services are voluntary involvement and not required for child development homes and child care centers and preschools. These combined numbers also are duplicated in that each consultant may work with the same program, but on different quality initiatives and specific performance goals. Low QRS 3-5 numbers are still a concern for our area, but they are increasing. The Board expressed appreciation for the strategic work that both Gina Wells, CCR&R consultant, and Joan Garrett, BASEC consultant, have completed for our counties.
- *Early Care & Education Supportive Services:* Cardinal 3Y Preschool Partnership (direct service) and North Mahaska Summer GAP Program (Kindergarten Transition / direct service). Both community school districts have the capacity to positively effect a large number of children throughout the school year (75: 3Y-5Y). District data is also readily available. These are two of our smaller school districts that are currently experiencing growth due to open enrollments. The percent of children showing age appropriate skills was high (93.33%). Although district personnel were not present at the meeting, the Board did express their appreciation for their commitment to working with MWECI.
- *Preschool Scholarship* Coordination (indirect service). Pat McReynolds, Area Director, coordinates the marketing, applications and follow up services for the quality preschool scholarships for individuals. Each year the scholarships vary according to eligible families' needs. This past year there were fewer applications than ever before (5), but that has already changed for FYE2018. All 5 (100%) recipients were demonstrating age appropriate skills at the end of the school year.
- *Preschool Scholarship Programs* (direct services). Pat worked with 4 preschools (SONshine, Creation Station, Seton and Living Hope) this past year with the preschool scholarship program. To support quality initiatives, MWECI does require all four preschools to be rated a level 3-5 QRS. Although this requirement does eliminate some preschools from participation, we have found that it has also encouraged private and public schools to get involved in the QRS process.
- *Family Support: Home Visiting* (direct service) Sieda PAT. This is the only long-term home visitation program that the MWECI Board continues to support (since January 2000). This was the first year that data was made available via the state-wide data system known as DAISEY. The MWECI Board was able to review specific DAISEY data for each county. Combined reports showed a high number of children and families (C71/F54) involved and that they received a high number of home visits (791) and group-based opportunities (87). Year-end outcomes based on the Life Skills Progression Instrument, indicated that families

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were reaching goals for healthy functioning, problem-solving and communication; social and concrete supports; and knowledge of child development and parenting; but still needing work in nurturing and attachment between parents and children. The Board expressed their appreciation to Lynn Godwin, PAT Program Manager, for the longevity and continuity of the program. Everyone agreed that the new data system, DAISEY, was a great improvement over REDCap.

- *Family Support: Group Parent Education* (direct services) BASEC-PBIS for Families and Wapello County NEST. Both the NEST and BASEC programs are direct services and delivered as group parent education. However, they are fundamentally different in their primary focus. The NEST focus is long-term with prenatal engagement and continued involvement up to the child's 3rd birthday. During this time, a variety of parenting curriculum is used and a point system allows for acquiring incentives. The BASEC focus is short-term focus on social and emotion development of children prenatal to 5 years. It utilizes a specific curriculum (6 - two hour sessions) and rewards full completion of the course with a nominal gift card. Both programs show a good number of families participating (BASEC32 / NEST75). Year-end outcomes based on the Protective Factors Survey, indicated that families were reaching goals for healthy functioning, problem-solving and communication; social and concrete supports; and knowledge of child development and parenting; but still needing work in nurturing and attachment between parents and children. (Close to the same percentages as the PAT program). Both programs also have an extensive collaborative partnership with other community providers that enable their ability to provide child care during classes. The Board expressed their appreciation to Jill Lane, BASEC Family Support Consultant, and Yvonne Baldwin-Greene, NEST Coordinator, for their flexibility with meeting the ever-changing families involved and their specific needs.
- *Administrative Staff:* Pat McReynolds, Area Director (service coordination and collaboration). The Area Director develops and maintains local collaborations and working relationships with local community leaders both in the public and private sectors from various groups, organizations, and agencies that are in alignment with early childhood services. She also facilitates collaboration between local providers, citizens, numerous county-wide human service planning efforts and state/local agencies and assists the Board with the development, implementation and updating of community and strategic plans. The full-time position is funded via both categorical administrative funds as well as SR-quality improvement and general use. The composite results of the MWECI Board's annual review of the Area Director's contract and performance were shared with Pat both via email (a copy was provided for her records) as well as face to face by the Vice Chair. The overall report was very positive and provided a comprehensive review of both contract compliance and personal performance. Report Excerpt: "Ms. McReynolds is a strong communicator at meetings and can accurately convey complicated subject matter to an inexperienced audience with maximum comprehension."
- *Early Childhood Funds & School Ready Funds /Administrative and Program Expenses Totals:* Each of the categorical expense reports were balanced and reflected accurate FYE 2017 financial information provided by both the fiscal agent and the Area Director.
- *Total Other Funding Report:* Contractors did report some additional funding provided by community partners (Kiwanis) and blended funding (PCAI).

c. Board approval of FYE 2017 Annual Report for Submission - **Lynelle Diers made a motion to approve the FYE 2017 MWECI Annual Report and authorization of Pat McReynolds, Area Director, to submit the report as required, Dean Cremer 2nd the motion.**

All Board Members present approved, motion passed unanimously.

4. Adjournment: Gina Buttikofer made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 5:20 PM, Lynelle Diers 2nd the motion. All Board Members present approved, motion passed unanimously.
